Student Safeguarding

New updates

Child sexual exploitation (CSE)

CSE can happen in person or online. An abuser will gain a child's trust or control them through violence or blackmail before moving onto sexually abusing them. This can happen in a short period of time.

When a child is sexually exploited online they might be persuaded or forced to:

send or post sexually explicit images of themselves film or stream sexual activities have sexual conversations.

Once an abuser has images, video or copies of conversations, they might use threats and blackmail to force a young person to take part in other sexual activity. They may also share the images and videos with others or circulate them online.

Gangs use sexual exploitation:

to exert power and control for initiation to use sexual violence as a weapon.

Children or young people might be invited to parties or gatherings with others their own age or adults and given drugs and alcohol. They may be assaulted and sexually abused by one person or multiple perpetrators. The sexual assaults and abuse can be violent, humiliating and degrading.

Building a community of respect

We have done much work since September to educate our students about what bullying is.

This week in assemblies we will be reinforcing the messages below and also highlighting to the students how to report concerns anonymously. Using the 'Whisper' site as shared below.

Please can you discuss below with your child and encourage, if needed, to log concerns on 'Whisper'

Bullying can take different forms, It could include:

physical bullying: hitting, slapping or pushing someone

verbal bullying: name calling, gossiping or threatening someone

non-verbal abuse: hand signs or text messages

emotional abuse: threatening, intimidating or humiliating someone

exclusion: ignoring or isolating someone

undermining, constant criticism or spreading rumours

controlling or manipulating someone

making silent, hoax or abusive calls

The following types of bullying are also hate crime:

racial, sexual, transphobic or homophobic bullying

bullying someone because they have a disability.

No single sign will indicate for certain that your child's being bullied, but watch out for:

belongings getting 'lost' or damaged

physical injuries, such as unexplained bruises

being afraid to go to school, being mysteriously 'ill' each morning, or skipping school

not doing as well at school

asking for, or stealing, money (to give to whoever's bullying them)

being nervous, losing confidence, or becoming distressed and withdrawn

problems with eating or sleeping

bullying others.

Passport to the Prom

There were some parental concerns raised on social media about the attendance target of 95%, please can I make clear, as we did to the Y11 students and parents who attended the Passport to the Prom Evening in December. All genuine medical absences will be taken into account.

'Passport to the Prom'. Y11s must take responsibility for keeping their passport safe and it will be updated weekly in tutor time to allow them to track their progress.

The criteria for Prom is as follows:

- 95% Attendance between January and May 15th (date of 1st core GCSE exam)
- Minimum of 500 reward points
- 300 GCSE Pods viewed
- 50 breakfast or after school revision sessions attended (this works out to roughly 3 per week)
